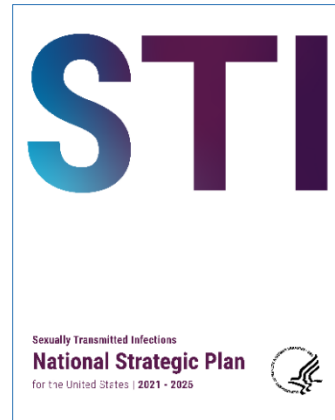


## Release of First-Ever Sexually Transmitted Infections National Strategic Plan
