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




Bureau of Health Workforce (BHW)

Increasing Access to Behavioral Health Services

Training providers to deliver quality behavioral health care, including substance use disorder treatment and medication-assisted treatment:

\$74.9 M – Behavioral Health Workforce Education and Training

\$39.6M – Mental and Behavioral Health Education and Training




In AY 17-18, BHW-sponsored programs used clinical training sites providing critical services, including more than 5,000 sites that provided substance use treatment services.

Improving Care in Underserved Communities

Training, Recruitment and Retention – Improved Access in Underserved Communities

Clinicians who receive training in community-based and underserved settings are more likely to practice in similar settings.

Through our programs, we work to improve workforce distribution by connecting providers to high-need areas with limited access to care.



- 60% of BHW-supported health professions trainees receive training in medically underserved communities.
- More than 145,000 students and trainees from rural backgrounds participated in BHWsponsored grant programs.





FY 2018 Summary

BHW awarded more than \$1 billion to 8,000+ organizations and individuals through more than 40 workforce programs.





46 percent of BHW graduates were employed in underserved areas.



FY 2019 Budget

- The FY 2019 budget provides a total of \$1.6 billion for HRSA health workforce programs
 - Prioritizes programs that require service commitments in underserved rural, urban and tribal areas
 - Creates a new graduate medical education grant program that consolidates funding from Medicare, Medicaid, and the Children's Hospital Graduate Medical Education Program
 - Puts focus on ending the national opioid epidemic.
