- **70%** of counties are rural (<**50,000** pop.)
- >99% of population served by a local health department
- 180,000 live births
- 44% of live births covered by Medicaid

- >85% of Medicaid Births












Entry to WIC in the First Trimester of Pregnancy






Percent of Women Initiating Prenatal Care in the First Trimester, by Medicaid Status

 Technical Assistance Plans





Very Low Birth Weight Rate Medicaid Eligible Infants










First Year of Life Medicaid Expenditures






Further Evaluation





Lessons Learned

- If you measure it, they will change
- Competition is healthy
- Shifts focus to results & outcomes
- Shifts attention to data accuracy
- Requires a sophisticated MIS
- Supplement with QA activities
- Can be done without additional money
- Federal initiatives can be successfully coordinated at the state level
