INational HCOP Academies Overview Purpose:

 To assist individuals from economically and educationally disadvantaged backgrounds with entering and graduating from an allied health or health professions program.

Goals:

- Develop skills needed to successfully compete for, enter and graduate from an allied health or health professions school.
- Improve retention, matriculation and graduation rates by implementing tailored enrichment programs designed to address the academic and social needs of trainees from disadvantaged backgrounds.



Provide opportunities for community-based health professions training, emphasizing experiences in underserved communities.



National HCOP Academies Overview

Eligible Entities:

- Accredited health professions schools (medicine, public health, dentistry, veterinary medicine, optometry, pharmacy),
- Allied health, chiropractic, podiatric medicine, public and non-profit schools that offer graduate programs in behavioral and mental health, programs for the training of physician assistants, and
- Other public or private nonprofit health or educational institutions, including community, technical and tribal





National HCOP Academies Overview

Target populations:

- Rising high school juniors/seniors
- Undergraduate freshman and/or sophomores enrolled in two year programs
- Undergraduate students in their 2nd, 3rd or 4th year
- Adult/non-traditional students (including veterans)
- Students in Health Professions Degree Programs





National HCOP Academy - Requirements

- HCOP National Ambassador Program
- Provide academic and social supports to students from disadvantaged backgrounds
- Data management and tracking
- Formalized Partnerships (Articulation Agreements) within university and with community partners
- Design activities to support students through degree completion and into employment in a primary care setting in a rural area and/or medically underserved community
- Recruitment, Facilitating Entry, and Preliminary Education and Health Research Training



Students are eligible to receive stipend and/or scholarship support



HCOP National Ambassador Program

- Must include a formal application process with defined eligibility criteria.
- At a minimum, must establish a cohort of at least 25 students each year to matriculate through completion or graduation from a health professions degree or certificate program.
- Leads to matriculation into the applicant or partner organization's 2- or 4year college/university, health or allied health professions school or employment in primary care settings in rural and underserved communities.
- Defined curriculum that help students prepare for meeting the admissions requirements and integrate educational activities, such as trainings and research projects (e.g. opioid abuse, and mental and behavioral health).

Saturday and Summer Programs continue.





National HCOP Academy: Snapshot

- Project period September 1, 2018 August 31, 2023
- FY 2020 Funding \$15 Million
 - Up to \$665,228 per grantee
- 21 grantees
- 9 HHS Regions Represented
- 15 states and the District of Columbia




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
