Life Course Approach

Among girls:

Health/Development

- 29.2% overweight or obese (10-17 yo)
- 40.7% (all ages) report <u>>1</u> adverse childhood experiences

Among women 18-44:

- 24.6% without well-woman visit in past 12 months
- 13.4% in "fair or poor" health
- 14.3% are current smokers
- 56.0% are overweight or obese
- 31% have household income of <\$25k

MCHB Core Investments

Title V Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant (Title V)	 Partners with states and territories to reduce maternal morbidity and mortality \$563M (FY21) formula awards to States
Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program (MIECHV)	 Funds states, territories, and tribal entities to develop and implement voluntary home visiting programs \$400M (FY21)
Healthy Start Initiative: Eliminating Disparities in Perinatal Health (Healthy Start)	 Supports grants to advance a community-based approach for improving health and reducing racial and ethnic disparities in perinatal health \$128M (FY21)



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MCHB Targeted Investments

State Maternal Health Innovation	 Task forces formed to improve state level surveillance and innovation in service delivery \$23M (FY21)
Alliance for Innovation on Maternal Health / AIM-CCI	 Safety bundles of evidence-based practices for hospitals and other settings \$9M (FY21)
NEW Maternal Mental Health Hotline	 Maternal mental health hotline, staffed by qualified counselors, 24 hours a day \$3M (FY21)

MCHB Targeted Investments

Screening and Treatment for Maternal Depression and Related Behavioral Disorders	 Telehealth to provide training and real-time psychiatric consultation and care coordination to front-line health care providers \$5M (FY21)
Challenge Competitions	 Prize competitions to create tech innovations to improve maternal health \$1.5M in prizes
Women's Preventive Services Initiative	 Lifespan preventive screening and services Anticipated \$950k (FY21)



HRSA/MCHB Impact: Tracking Improvements



In FY 2019, **82%** of MIECHV caregivers were screened for depression within 3 months of enrollment or 3 months of delivery, **an increase from 75%** in FY 2017.

In FY 2018, **77.8%** of Healthy Start participants initiated prenatal care during the first trimester, **exceeding the target of 75%**




In FY 2020, State MHI grantees conducted mobile obstetric simulations for clinical providers, established mobile clinics, and supported telemedicine **to increase access to care**.





HRSA/MCHB Impact: Tracking Improvements

Alliance for Innovation on Maternal Health (AIM)



38 states, approximately 1,500 hospitals *Implementation as of Oct. 2020*

- Tennessee Increased from 45% to 72%
 the percentage of birthing women with opioid
 use disorder (OUD) who received
 medication-assisted treatment at discharge
 between 2019 and 2020
- Louisiana 23% reduction in SMM among birthing women with hypertension between 2016 and 2019
- Florida 8% reduction in low-risk cesarean births between Jan. 2018 and June 2019





Other HRSA Investments

- MCHB partners with HRSA's Federal Office of Rural Health Policy on HRSA's Rural Maternity and Obstetrics Management Strategies (RMOMS) pilot program
- The program aims to:
 - Develop a sustainable network approach to coordinate maternal and obstetrics care within a rural region
 - Increase the delivery and access of preconception, pregnancy, labor and delivery, and postpartum services
 - Develop a sustainable financing model







Other HRSA Investments

Health Center Program



Providing primary care covering the prenatal to postpartum period is part of the Health Center Program's core mission.

In 2019, care included:

- Contraceptive management services for nearly 1.7 million patients
- Pap tests for approximately 1.8 million patients
- Prenatal care to over 583,300 patients, performing over 175,200 deliveries

Health Workforce Programs



National Health Service Corps and other programs place an array of practitioners in underserved areas

- Programs train an array of women's health and maternal providers, including midwives
