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Who We Are

- One of the largest federally-qualified health center (FQHC) organizations in the country
- Focus is on patient- and family-centered, community-based health care to:
 - Eliminate racial and ethnic health disparities
 - Engage patients in prevention and screening
 - Improve and extend patient care beyond our walls



Our History

- Roots on Chicago's west side in the mid-1980s
- Established in 1991 as a Federally Qualified Health Center
- ACCESS operates 32 community health centers with OB services in Chicago and suburban Cook and DuPage counties
- Healthy Start grantee since 1997



Who We Serve

- This year, ACCESS will serve more than 175,000 low-income individuals and families, including more than 37,000 uninsured patients.
- Last year alone, ACCESS provided care to 7,377 pregnant women,
 22,492 patients with hypertension, 13,065 patients with diabetes and 9,348 asthmatic patients.
- ACCESS' patient demographics reflect the communities we proudly serve each day:
 - 42% are children age 17 and under
 - 51% are Hispanic
 - 32% are African-American
 - 75% are at or below the 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Level




Our Experience as a Healthy Start Grantee

- ACCESS is the lead agency with two additional FQHC partners on Chicago's west side
 - Lawndale Christian Health Center
 - PCC Community Wellness Center
- As an FQHC, we act as the hub for the communities we serve
- As a medical home, we are able to see the woman and her family before, throughout and after her pregnancy
- Healthy Start leadership is integrated into the clinical care teams
- Longstanding partnerships with local OB practices and delivering hospitals within our target communities

Our Experience as a Healthy Start Grantee

- Our case managers and community health workers are integrated within the community and the health center
- Grant has helped drive clinical excellence across our care network
- Risk screenings are now integrated into our care models with consistent identification of high risk women, tracking and reporting
- Healthy Start learnings and best practices have helped ACCESS lay the foundation for our Strong Start maternity care home program and our MCH care broadly



Preliminary Learnings from Strong Start

- Standardized prenatal care rooted in evidence-based practices across our network
- Standardized our approach to measuring the impact of our MCH initiatives
- Developed a patient-centered and collaborative care coordination model to assist patients in navigating various OB services
- Care coordinators have assisted patients in navigating various Managed Care Organizations in order to successfully navigate authorization processes to ensure timely treatment
- Engage women early into prenatal care as part of the medical home to have the best chance of impacting birth outcomes



Building Best Practices Across Care Models

- Using our learnings from Healthy Start and Strong Start, we are effectively building out care coordination for all our populations
- Using evidence-based practices to address disparities and meet the needs of our communities



Opportunities

- Provide funding that can be utilized across multiple sites/communities/ populations
- Continue to bring FQHC leaders to strategic MCH conversations
- Continue to fund programs focused on the lifecourse perspective (not just pregnancy)
