FY21 BHW Loan Repayment & Scholarship Programs

- The American Rescue Plan added \$200 million in funding for Nurse Corps Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs
 - \$10 million dedicated for Women's Health Nurse Practitioners, Obstetrics and Gynecology Nurse Practitioners, Certified Nurse Midwives, and OB-GYN Registered nurses
- NHSC Students to Service Loan Repayment Program added nurse midwives as a new eligible discipline









Primary Care Training and Enhancement-Community Prevention and Maternal Health (PCTE-CPMH)

- Trains primary care physicians in maternal health care clinical services or population health in order to improve maternal health outcomes.
- Aims to increase maternal health care expertise and the number of primary care physicians trained in enhanced obstetric care in rural and/or underserved areas.





Women's Health Workforce Projections







By 2030, we project these changes in the supply of women's health service providers:

- A 7% decrease in supply to 47,490 obstetricians/gynecologists
- Faster growth in supply of other providers: Certified nurse midwives (32% increase); Women's health nurse practitioners (89% increase); Women's health physician assistants (56% increase)
- An increase in demand for full-time women's health service providers including:
 Obstetricians/gynecologists, Certified nurse midwives, Women's health nurse practitioners (all 4% increase); Women's health physician assistants
